L.J Tan is Director of Medicine and Public Health at the American Medical Association. He received his MS in Molecular Biology from New York University, his PhD in Immunology/Microbiology from Northwestern University Medical School, and completed a postdoctoral fellowship in Molecular Immunology at the University of Chicago Hospitals. He currently serves as a member of the Advisory Committee for Immunization Practices (ACIP), of the Advisory Council for the Elimination of Tuberculosis (ACET), of the Steering Committees for the National Viral Hepatitis Roundtable, Voices For Vaccines, the 317 Coalition, and the Partnership to End Cervical Cancer (and on the Board for its Foundation). He also chairs the National Influenza Vaccine Summit, co-sponsored by the AMA and the CDC, and recently organized the first National Immunization Congress.
